#### Introduction

## CRS 54th AGM

The 54<sup>th</sup> CRS AGM was held on March 20<sup>th</sup>, 2025 at Edgbaston High School for Girls, Westbourne Road. The meeting was well attended with over 90 CRS members as well as local Councillors Deirdre Alden and Matt Bennett and representatives from Principle Estate Management.

CRS Chair Peter Arnold described some of the work of the Committee in the past year, including the production of a revamped Newsletter, regular presence at the Edgbaston Artisan Markets as well as meetings with Calthorpe Estate CEO, Haydn Cooper and other key local institutions including both the University of Birmingham and Birmingham City University.

The Committee's new lead for Social Events, Chrissie Twigg, outlined the social programme for 2025 and Peter Wall (Committee Member for "Community of Communities") described his work in defining and seeking redress for the fallout from the failure by FirstPort (previous managing agents) to produce agreed and audited accounts, as well as a failure to chase service charge arrears. He has worked tirelessly to bring matters to the attention of Calthorpe Estate and to encourage them to take appropriate and timely action.

The speaker, Bob Warman, gave a very personal address titled "Edgbaston Memories". Bob's connection with Edgbaston extends back to the 1960s when he first lived in the area at Whetstone Close. His affection for the area was clear as he talked of places where he had lived including Estria Road and Frederick Road. He described buildings and their histories, including his home on Harborne Road which had once been home to "recovering and recuperating" Polish Air Force Officers during the Second World War! Perhaps even more colourful than the photographs that he shared were his memories and stories of local people, including TV, sport and music stars Carl Wayne and Bob Willis; local businessmen Tommy Scraggs and Maurice Bulpit. Bob included Maurice's fascinating memories of Neville Chamberlain and mentioned his cleaner from Estria Road who had, as a young woman, attended the Nuremberg Rallies of the late thirties.

Bob's theme was that for him, Edgbaston was all about its "Buildings and Memories". It was easy to see why and even easier to see how the audience appreciated such an interesting and entertaining talk.

The evening afforded members the opportunity to socialise over a drink (or two) and we look forward to the next one, next year!

## Fatality on a local road

Sadly, in early March there was another road fatality on the Estate when a young motorcyclist was killed at the crossroads of Frederick and St James Road. This crossroads has a long history, with over 30 accidents occurring over the last ten years, almost all of which have seen at least two cars written off, roads being shut, and emergency services called out. All these accidents have been caused by vehicles travelling down Frederick Road from the city and failing to 'see and stop' at the crossroads. Following last month's fatality Calthorpe Residents Society are working with local residents and local councillors to try to get the Council to undertake changes to the crossroads to make it safer for both vehicles, cyclists and pedestrians.

# **Edgbaston Guinea Gardens - part of the Calthorpe Estate.**

Nestled in the heart of Edgbaston, the Guinea Gardens are a hidden gem with a rich history dating back to the Victorian era. Originally known as The Malthouse Meadows, these gardens were established around 1848 and are among the last surviving examples of detached town gardens in the UK. Unlike traditional allotments, Guinea Gardens feature hedged plots with doors instead of gates, creating a unique and picturesque landscape.

Today, the Westbourne Road Leisure Gardens house 87 plots, offering a tranquil retreat for gardeners from all walks of life. Some cultivate vegetables, while others design serene spaces with lawns and ponds to attract wildlife. With a Grade II listing, these gardens stand as a testament to Birmingham's horticultural heritage. ### Trees we like

In Edgbaston we are proud of our greenery and in particular our trees, so we have decided to highlight in our Newsletter updates some of the special trees on the Calthorpe Estate, starting in this edition with the oldest tree in the Birmingham Botanical Gardens. This Copper Beech tree, which sits on the eastern edge of the Gardens just down from the café, is over 200 years old. It was there when the Gardens were established in 1829 and although suffering in recent years from disease caused by compaction it is still a wonder to look at throughout the year.
